Pastoral Care

Shining a Light on Poverty

Two weeks ago, if you were driving on King St. by Trinity United Church in Beamsville, you would have noticed a blue tent on the lawn. Irene Romagnoli, a member of Trinity hoped to make the public more aware of homelessness by spending a week in the tent. As she searched for water, bathrooms, food and places to get warm she became keenly aware of the struggle homeless people have for basic necessities. The number of people who ignored her, spoke keenly to the loneliness of homelessness. If someone stopped by, she asked them to sign a petition to be sent to the Ontario Government to create poverty safety nets like a guaranteed income.

On Dec. 3rd, I attended a panel discussion to learn more about poverty and homelessness. The panelists were Lyn Timmers, the Deputy Mayor of Lincoln, Carol Fuhrer the Executive Director of Community Care West Niagara, Dr. Karl Stobbe the medical director of REACH Niagara and Rev. Karen Orlandi the minister of Silver Spire United Church.

Over sixty people attended bringing thought-provoking questions and ideas. One of the learnings for me, was that homeless people are not always visible. They are people living in their cars, couch-surfing and living in precarious situations which may suddenly change because of illness, separation or job loss. I learned the term renoviction, if a landlord owns the building, the whole building can be evicted for renovations. It seems that our basic needs, food and housing have become profit centres. Many in the group called for a livable guaranteed income.

Some people might think that homeless situations don't exist in Fonthill, but I imagine they are hidden. Certainly there is a scarcity of low-rental housing here and our food bank is used more than ever as food prices rise. I know when I took someone to the St. Catharines food bank, I was shocked. The building was filled not with street people as I imagined, but women my age. Women who were struggling to make ends meet.

Lack of public transportation was another area cited that makes it very difficult for people without a car. Welland and St. Catharines have more services, but how do you get there? Next steps for the group? They will compile information, isolate the gaps in services, seek solutions, share that with people who can make it happen.

As a church community, we need to continue to support our local food banks and the Hope Centre. We should keep talking to our politicians, asking about housing, transportation and medical services.

From the Finance Committee

We are pleased to report that as of Oct.31st, there was a year-to-date surplus of \$4,825 in the operating fund. This included approx. \$2,500 in early receipts from the house tour. As you know this year's tour was extremely successful and we will see the overall net position in the Nov. statement. We are very much encouraged by these results.

As mentioned in the Fall Grapevine, we must complete some major work in the area where the Hydro line enters the building and with the main electrical panel. We are hoping to have this done over the next two weeks. We are working with all tenants, plus committees re-scheduling as the power will be off while the work is being done. We expect it could take 4-6 hours. Projected costs are \$10,000 +/-. We should also note when we turned the furnace on in October, we incurred repairs totaling \$2,100 to replace pressure valves and older connections which were leaking. As mentioned in the past it is difficult to find some of the parts.

The Finance and Property Committee would like to take this occasion to say "THANKS" for your very generous support over the past year.

We also wish each of you a Very Merry Christmas and a Happy and Healthy New Year.
