Our congregation has much to be grateful for and much to look forward to as we transition into the summer months. Despite lacking a full-time minister for two years, it does not feel so due to the steadfast leadership of Rev. Dr. Gordon Crossfield, who joined us in September 2023. Initially, Gordon committed to a six-month term to assist with our amalgamation transitions. This was intended to be a short-term 20-hour weekly position. Currently, he is on his fourth six-month contract, often exceeding the expected hours. Rev. Dr. Crossfield has provided consistent, faithful, dedicated and caring leadership and his presence is invaluable. Additionally, Wendy has become an integral part of our church's community by participating in various committees and activities. We have really been doubly blessed. July 27 will be Gordon's last service, but we hope both Wendy and Gordon will join us when they can in the future. We owe them immense gratitude for their contributions, which have significantly strengthened our congregation. Further details about a planned celebration to properly thank them will be communicated soon.

In August of last year, a Search Committee was established to find a new full-time minister. Chaired by Dick Hamilton and assisted by Sandra Harding and Keith Rae, this team undertook the challenging task amidst numerous vacancies in the Niagara Region. Their diligent efforts led to the identification of not just any minister but one ideally suited to our congregation. On June 1, they presented Miss Rowena Heatherington-Wilson, a student minister, as their chosen candidate. Her biography is included in this newsletter. During the service, attended by 55 individuals physically and 9 via Zoom, totaling 64 attendees, Rowena received 57 affirmative votes, 1 negative vote, and 6 abstentions (which includes the search committee members). She will officially begin her duties on September 1, 2025, and will participate in the July 27 service with Rev.Dr. Crossfield. We owe a debt of gratitude to the Search Committee for their dedication, patience, persistence and determination. Job well done!!

The selection of a new minister marks a pivotal chapter in our congregation's story. It reflects both the dedication of our members and a shared commitment to preserving the essence of community while embracing a future of growth and collaboration.

Having a student minister presents unique opportunities to contribute to the future success of the United Church of Canada. Rowena, holding a master's in divinity, will be licensed to administer sacraments, perform weddings, and officiate funerals. The Horseshoe Falls Region will appoint a Supervising Minister to meet with her regularly and attend all Council and Congregational meetings. Additionally, a Lay Supervision Team, consisting of 3-4 members, will be formed to collaborate with Rowena on mutual learning goals, provide constructive feedback, and offer support. All of this is intended to lead to our student minister being ordained in the United Church of Canada in 2 years' time. This represents a valuable chance to learn and grow together with Rowena. Interested members are encouraged to contact me. Training by will be provided to help understand the goals, roles and responsibilities.

Summer Service Schedule:

We will be continuing with joint summer services with our friends from Fenwick United Church starting on June 29. All services this year will be held in Fonthill United Church at 10 a.m. Services in June and July will be conducted by Rev. Dr. Gordon Crossfield, followed by Rev. Dr. Garry van Bruchem in August. The lower hall will be available for coffee and functions as of

June 22 until a date in August which will be advised later. Regular services will recommence on September 7 at 9:30 a.m. in our sanctuary under the guidance of our new student minister.

Rowena hails from Guelph and will be serving Fonthill United as a Supervised Ministry Student beginning in September 2025. This leads to ordination as a United Church minister in two years. She just completed a Master of Divinity degree through University of Toronto at Emmanuel College. Finance & Property Committee Update Propose

It is hard to believe we are now approximately halfway through 2025 and Fonthill United continues to face a variety of challenges which, working together, we address and resolve positively. While we will miss Rev. Gordon and Wendy Crossfield, we are all anxious to welcome the new minister who should be on board by September 1st. We extend our sincere appreciation to the Search Committee for all their hard work over the past year.

For the first four months of this year, there is a surplus in the operating fund of \$6,068 compared to a budgeted shortfall of \$11,996. For the corresponding period last year, we incurred a shortfall of \$3,845. There are several reasons for this positive trend as follows:

- Member giving's at \$59,583 are \$9,583 above budget due to the fact we have received some annual contributions earlier than last year. These gifts, while positively impacting current numbers, will average out over the balance of the year.
- Rental income is up due to higher usage of the building. We received \$1,000 for the Ontario Election and a similar amount will be reported in June for the Federal Election.
- Compensation expenses at \$35,857 are \$ 8,741 below budget and \$ 4,511 lower than 2024. When completing the budget for 2025, we assumed a new minister would be on board by March 1st at which point we would be responsible for increased pension and benefit costs. These lower costs will continue until September.

- Total operating expenses amount to \$73,670 vs budget of \$77,679. Expenses are virtually the same as in 2024. While we saw savings in compensation costs, we had some significant increases in snow removal, \$4,314 over budget and utilities, \$ 2,221 over budget. For anyone who was in Fonthill in January and February, the increase in snow removal costs is self-explanatory. The increase in utilities costs relate to ongoing repairs in the heating system.

The YTD surplus is extremely positive and again largely due to the generosity of our members. With the surplus in the operating fund, day-to-day cash requirements are being met, and we do not need to use any reserve funds. At the end of April, total assets amount to \$273,932 of which \$269,664 comprises cash and liquid investments.

Property:

Over the past four months the usual issues with an aging property have incurred and include:

- When we turned the heat on last fall several issues arose with the pipes and rads and the total cost to repair, over 2-3 months, amounted to roughly \$3,000.
- Some work has been required to repair the sump pump under the elevator shaft to fix the odor in the lower hall.
- The fridge in the kitchen has finally worn out and will be replaced during the first week of June.
- Work to complete the installation of the new electrical panel was done in January and the cost of approx. \$11,000 was covered in fiscal 2024.
- The Pelham Carden Club will be working on all flower gardens in the week of June 3rd.
- The Scouts completed their annual spring cleanup of the property in early April.

We would like to once again Thank Rich Miller for all he does around the church. Please appreciate and acknowledge his efforts as they reduce our maintenance and other costs by a significant amount each year.

We will be meeting with Montessori School shortly to review their lease moving forward. We expect it will be renewed for a two-year term with a slight increase in the rental rate. Finally, and after the Annual Meeting, discussions have taken place with the Town Hall, The Trustees and Houseshoe Falls Regional Council re the long development prospects for The Fonthill United Church Property. We have also been working with a potential new consultant and can advise very preliminary concepts are exciting and will preserve Fonthill United Church well in the future. Be assured the Membership will be engaged once a preliminary longer-term plan is open for review.

Thank you for your continued financial and volunteer support. 2025 is shaping up to be a great year for Fonthill United Church!
